- Please describe in detail how the reclassification of energy allocations for Holyrood and wind generation will ensure the reasonable allocation of all production costs for the Island Interconnected System in 2018 and 2019.
- A. Mr. P.Bowman does not propose changes to allocation of production costs in the Cost of Service study. There is no reason to expect that allocating capacity costs on a CP basis, and energy costs allocated to annual undifferentiated energy use, would be inappropriate for the test years.
 - In respect of classification, the "reclassification" in question relates to the demand:energy components of wind and Holyrood capital costs (not Holyrood fuel). There is no reason to believe that added off-island imports will change the output of wind (which is a "take it or leave it" type of generation, tied to the wind regime). There is a reason to expect that off-island imports will change the way the Holyrood capital asset is used, and as a result the Holyrood plant should be classified to demand:energy appropriately.
- Note that Holyrood fuel (including hypothetical fuel that is not expected to be used) will remain classified 100% to energy.

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
