Q. Page 5, lines 10-12. Please explain further Mr. Bowman's position, including whether he is recommending that Hydro withdraw its 2017 general rate application at this time and how does he recommend that the Board address the current application given his opinion that it "might be better to divert time from this Application to the numerous other regulatory filings that Hydro has on its plate".

A. Mr. Doug Bowman recommends that the Board address the current Application because current rates do not reflect costs under the new Island supply regime brought on by the commissioning of the LIL and ML transmission projects in 2018. A new cost of service study is needed to identify costs under the new supply regime and allocate those costs to Island customer classes. Current Island customer rates require adjustment to reflect the new cost allocations.

Sadly, the cost of service study proposed by Hydro in the 2017 GRA does not reflect the new supply regime, but rather assumes that low-cost off-island purchases would not be available and that Holyrood would continue to operate as it has in the past. There is a need for Hydro to file a 2019 test year cost of service study based on the expected supply regime with off-island purchases, and file the information documented in the response to PUB-CA-003 in support of the cost of service study. Mr. Doug Bowman recommends that the Board address the current Application, but not until the information in PUB-CA-003 is filed; otherwise, it is not possible for the Board and the parties to properly assess the Application.

Mr. Doug Bowman is concerned about Hydro statements indicating the Provincial Government will be setting electricity rates for the Province, such as "The Provincial Government has indicated that it plans to keep rates at par with the forecast Atlantic Canada average of 17 cents per kWh" (LAB-NLH-36) and "rate mitigation actions or plans beyond what Hydro has proposed in the 2017 GRA Hydro will be a policy decision of government" (CA-NLH-6). It would be disappointing, and costly to consumers, if the Board and the parties were to expend the effort necessary to resolve this case only to have it overturned by Government. Mr. Doug Bowman is hopeful that the Board can direct Hydro to file the information set out in PUB-CA-003, complete the review process for this Application and issue a Decision in a timely and efficient manner that will cause the Government to reconsider the need for its involvement in the rate setting process, at least until the period beyond the commissioning of Muskrat Falls generation. The Board, being both "informed and independent", is in the best position to decide future rates in the Province. Mr. Doug Bowman is confident that the Board in its Decision on the Application will take into consideration the evidence filed by all parties to this undertaking. He is concerned that the Provincial Government is not as "informed" on these matters, and may rely too heavily of information provided by Hydro rather than the parties.

¹ Mr. Doug Bowman notes that Hydro confidently states that the Provincial Government will involve itself in the rate setting regime, but seemingly believes that there is little that can be done to repeal, or make needed amendments to, OC2013-343 and OC2009-063.
