Q. What steps will be taken by Newfoundland Power and Bell Aliant to mitigate the risks referred to in PUB-NP-34, and what are the anticipated results, setting out the time line required, of these actions?

A. Please refer to the Response to Request for Information PUB-NP-34 for a description of the steps taken by Newfoundland Power to address the risks referred to in the Response to Request for Information PUB-NP-34. Newfoundland Power expects to achieve the results indicated in the evidence and referred to in the Response to Request for Information PUB-NP-34.

Newfoundland Power observes that the actual cost benefits for Newfoundland Power's customers which will result from the new Joint-Use regime could exceed those indicated in the Prefiled Evidence for a number of reasons.

Firstly, it is expected that the pole count survey will disclose more third party attachments exist than are currently billed. The analysis contained in the evidence assumes no increase in third party attachments resulting from the pole count survey. Any increase in the number of third party attachments identified in the pole count survey will increase the benefits associated with the new Joint-Use regime. <sup>1</sup>

Secondly, it is expected that negotiations for new third party attachment rates will commence later in 2011. The analysis contained in the evidence assumes that rates between third parties and Newfoundland Power will continue to be determined under the current agreements through 2015. Any increase which might be negotiated over the next year could increase the benefits associated with the new Joint-Use regime. <sup>3</sup>

 Finally, the analysis contained in the Prefiled Evidence does not assume any further cooperative construction, inspection or maintenance activities between Newfoundland Power and Bell Aliant past 2012.<sup>4</sup> Newfoundland Power expects that some co-operative arrangements might well be negotiated for this period. Any co-operative arrangements negotiated with Bell Aliant respecting Joint-Use of Support Structures which reduce Newfoundland Power's costs beyond 2012, will increase the benefits associated with the new Joint-Use regime from that indicated in the evidence.

 These potential benefits have not been included in the analysis contained in the Prefiled Evidence supporting the Application because the potential benefits were not sufficiently certain at the time of filing the Application nor are they certain at the current time.

Based on 7% of the poles surveyed to date in the pole count survey, the there appears to be an increase in the number of poles to where 3<sup>rd</sup> parties are attached. Should the pole count survey continue to confirm increased attachments at the rate indicated to date, then Newfoundland Power's revenue from 3<sup>rd</sup> parties (and the associated benefit to customers) could increase by as much as \$500,000 per year under the new Joint Use regime.

For example, if Newfoundland Power were to agree to a rate for 3<sup>rd</sup> party attachments equivalent to the \$18.53 charged by Bell Aliant, the benefit to customers, in addition to that indicated in the evidence, would be approximately \$200,000 per year.

As indicated in the Prefiled Evidence, Page 10, lines 1 to 3 and footnote 25, Newfoundland Power has agreed to perform certain work for Bell Aliant through 2012.
