Prior to 2001, construction and maintenance activities for Joint Use Support Structures were shared between Newfoundland Power and Bell Aliant. Since 2001, these activities have been the sole responsibility of Newfoundland Power and, as such, these activities have been conducted in accordance with the Company's construction and maintenance standards. The maintenance standards include inspection and emergency maintenance requirements that can impact both the frequency and duration of power outages.

There has been an overall trend of improved electrical system reliability over the past decade. It is a generally accepted engineering observation that electrical system reliability is primarily influenced by the condition of the electrical system assets. This includes, but is not limited to, the condition of Joint Use Support Structures.

To ensure electrical system reliability as it relates to Joint Use Support Structures is maintained on a go forward basis, Newfoundland Power negotiated the 2011 Joint Use Agreement ("2011 JUA") to ensure that the Joint Use Support Structures that are owned by Bell Aliant will be constructed and maintained consistent with Newfoundland Power standards.² In this manner, the 2011 JUA preserves the service benefits to customers that were achieved through the 2001 Joint Use Facilities Partnership Agreement.
