1 Section 11.03 of the Joint Use Agreement provides certain default notice periods. Q. 2 Does this mean that Newfoundland Power and its customers will have to wait an 3 additional two hours for Bell Aliant to respond to an emergency after notice has 4 been provided? 5 6 A. No. 7 8 The default notice periods provided in Section 11.03 of the 2011 Joint Use Agreement do 9 not mean that Newfoundland Power and its customers will have to wait an additional two 10 hours for Bell Aliant to respond to an emergency after notice has been provided. 11 12 As stated in the Response to Request for Information PUB-NP-55, there will be no 13 change to the dispatch of trouble call response following the proposed sale of Joint Use 14 Support Structures to Bell Aliant. 15 16 As stated in the Response to Request for Information PUB-NP-57, in the case of damage 17 to a Joint Use Support Structure, Newfoundland Power will immediately initiate a request 18 for the assistance of a pole contractor, regardless of the ownership of the Support 19 Structure. Whether it was a Bell Aliant pole contractor or a Newfoundland Power pole 20 contractor that was called for assistance would depend upon ownership of the Support Structure. The party that owned the Support Structure would ultimately be responsible 21 22 for paying for the work performed. 23

For the foregoing reasons, trouble call response time will be unaffected by the proposed sale of the Support Structures to Bell Aliant.
