- Q. [Account 350.01] As it relates to Account 350.01 Transmission Plant Easements, please state if the Company plans to continue utilizing easements, ROWs, etc. as it replaces investment that sits on the asset. If not, specifically state how the Company plans to provide service at such location as well as why any alternative is more appropriate than continued usage of the existing asset.
- A. Where it is appropriate and possible to do so, Newfoundland Power will continue to utilize existing easements or rights-of-way for its transmission lines. However, there are instances when it may be necessary to retire an existing easement or right-of-way and acquire a replacement.

For example, the relocation of all or a part of a transmission line may be required, and therefore appropriate, in the following circumstances:

- Relocations for outside parties may be required where the existing location conflicts with other development plans. Examples include new highways or streets, buildings and residential subdivisions.
- 2) Relocations may be based on engineering judgements made during the course of planning for the rebuild of a transmission line. For example, a transmission line may have initially followed a cross-country route, whereas a rebuild of the line may involve relocating a portion of the line closer to a highway to reduce response times in the event of trouble on the line.
- 3) In some instances, it may not be possible during reconstruction of a transmission line to de-energize a radial line that is the sole power supply for a geographic area. In such instances, reconstruction may involve the construction of a new line in an adjacent right-of-way and decommissioning of the original line and retirement of the original right-of-way once the new line is completed.
