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Q. Page 5, line 30 to Page 6, line 1

In Order No. P.U. 47 (1982), the Board ordered that Newfoundland Power "shall use the unit summation procedure to calculate rates of depreciation for all of [Newfoundland Power's] plant in service with effect from January 1, 1983." In light of that order, please provide an explanation of what Mr. Pous means when he states that the ELG calculation procedure "is not required but rather is an elective alternative".

A.

 Newfoundland Power did comply with the Commission order in 1982 as it applied to that proceeding. All aspects of depreciation are subject to modification and adjustment in each subsequent proceeding before a regulatory body. Just as Newfoundland and Labrador Hydro recently changed its calculation procedure, the same opportunity exists for Newfoundland Power Company. Newfoundland Power could have elected to be consistent with Newfoundland and Labrador Hydro in utilizing the ALG procedure. Indeed, had Newfoundland Power elected the ALG procedure, that election would have resulted in consistent depreciation calculations for all components of charges to customers for different portions of the overall rates charged to customers.
