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- Q. Does NP remove its retired poles itself or is that contracted out to a private contractor? What happens to the poles once they are retired for reasons other than degradation by natural forces i.e. decay and wear and year? Who takes possession and ownership of such retired poles and upon what terms? If the terms have varied over the period from 2002 to present, please indicate in what respect(s).
- A. Pole removals are carried out by private contractors.

Once a pole has been removed, the contractor takes possession and ownership of the wooden poles. All steel poles remain the property of Newfoundland Power.

The terms of these arrangements have not changed since 2002.

Following are the terms and conditions of the Company's current pole supply and installation contract relating to salvageable wooden poles:

- 1. The contractor shall return all salvageable poles to the pole storage facility where they will be kept on bunks separate from the consignment pole stock.
- 2. The Contractor shall install used poles before new ones in accordance with the installation criteria outlined below, unless otherwise instructed by the Owner.
- 3. All used poles installed shall be reported as such to the Owner's Representative.
- 4. The installation and material cost of salvageable poles will be invoiced at the same price as new poles.
- 5. Salvageable poles shall only be reinstalled per the following criteria:
 - a. Poles salvaged within ten (10) years of the manufacturer's date stamp may be reinstalled as per existing class and height.
 - b. Poles salvaged after ten (10) years but within 25 years of the manufacturer's date stamp shall be reinstalled only as service or streetlight installations.
 - c. Original date nail shall not be removed from salvageable poles.
- 6. In the event the age of the pole is unable to be determined, the pole will not be salvaged.
