12 13 14 15		From a deferred cost perspective, the Company could maintain sub-accounts within the combined deferral account to track electrification and CDM costs for analysis and reporting purposes.
16 17 18 19 20 21 22		From a cost recovery perspective, Newfoundland Power has proposed to recover deferred electrification costs over 10 years in its <i>2022/2023 General Rate Application</i> (the "2022/2023 GRA"). ¹ In the 2022/2023 GRA, the Company has also proposed increasing the amortization period for its customer CDM programs from 7 to 10 years. ² Both of these amortization periods are based on the average life of the technologies of the respective programs.
23 24 25		If both electrification and CDM program costs are amortized over the same period, Newfoundland Power cannot envisage any issues with the combined account approach.
26 27 28		If it were determined by the Board that separate amortization periods were appropriate for electrification and CDM programs, it may likewise be appropriate to maintain separate accounts in that circumstance.
