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- 1Q.(Reference CA-NP-117) It is stated "Newfoundland Power does not currently2have a program in place that attempts to extend the life of an individual wood3pole." Does this suggest that currently, rather than implement a program to4extend the life of wood poles, NP policy is to simply replace poles based on the5results of inspections?6
- A. The referenced statement does not seek to imply anything beyond its plain meaning.
 There is no suggestion that, currently, rather than implement a program to extend the
 life of wood poles, Newfoundland Power's policy is to replace poles based on the results
 of inspections.

The response to Request for Information CA-NP-117 goes on to say that Newfoundland 12 13 Power is currently undertaking a review of its asset management practices to ensure the Company's practices continue to be adequate given the age of its electrical system, and 14 15 remain consistent with industry best practice. This review will include an assessment of 16 the Company's transmission line asset management practices, including its capital 17 investment and maintenance programs. Any change to the Company's current inspection and maintenance program, or the potential implementation of a wood pole 18 19 chemical re-treatment program, would be considered in the full context of the lifecycle management of the Company's transmission assets. 20
