## 1 Section 5: Customer Rates

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## Q. Volume 1, Section 3, page 3-4, line 8. Why does Newfoundland Power expect low customer growth over the 2024 to 2026 period?

- A. Newfoundland Power's forecast of customer growth/connections is based on the
  Conference Board of Canada's ("CBOC") forecast of housing starts and completions
  from its medium-term outlook, together with a three-year average of the historical pattern
  between customer connections and housing starts and completions. This approach
  combines the CBOC's outlook with the Company's historical data to calculate a forecast
  number of new customer connections.
  - The CBOC is forecasting a reduced level of housing construction in the near-term, which results in lower forecast customer connections for Newfoundland Power over the 2024 to 2026 period.

## For context, the CBOC indicates the following in their economic outlook dated September 6, 2023:

"...residential construction is forecast to enter a period of extended decline. Higher mortgage rates are stifling short-term demand for housing and demographic trends and population decline will weaken the longer-term outlook for housing demand and residential construction. Our forecast calls for an annual average decline in housing starts of 19.9 per cent."<sup>1</sup>
